# ACTS OF THE APOSTLES

Lesson #12 -God's Word Prevails Scripture Reading: Acts 12:25-13:3

### Introduction:

- 1. During Paul's first missionary journey, there were challenges, but God's word prevailed!
- 2. While the forces against the church variate, the word of God still prevails.
- 3. We observe some challenges on Paul's first missionary journey.

## I. PREACHING AT CYPRUS -13:4-12

- A. The proconsul
  - 1. Structure of the government
    - a. Imperial province
      - i. which was for more troubled areas which required more Roman legions
      - ii. The money collected went to the Emperor
    - b. Senatorial province. Money collected from them went to the Roman Senate.
  - 2. History of the government in Cyprus
    - a. Cyprus was taken by Rome in 57 BC
    - b. It was a Imperial province until 22 BC when it became a senatorial province
    - c. The ruler of the senatorial province was called proconsul.
    - d. At this time, the proconsul was Sergius Paulus
      - i. He is described by Luke as "an intelligent man" or "a man of understanding"
      - ii. He sought to hear the word of God and sent for Barnabas and Saul.

# B. The false prophet Bar-Jesus

- 1. He was a sorcerer who did not want Sergius Paulus influenced by Barnabas and Saul.
  - a. Their teaching would cause him to lose his place of influence.
  - b. He was motivated out of selfish ambition rather than a desire for truth. How truth this is still for many today!
- 2. Paul struck him with blindness
  - a. This is one of the rare times when miracles are intended to harm -Ref. Ac 5:1-11
  - b. This blindness was to accomplish two key purposes:
    - i. It revealed to proconsul that God's power was far greater than Bar-Jesus
    - ii. It would hopefully reveal that same truth to Bar-Jesus as well. It is unknown if he ever became a follower or not.

### II. PREACHING AT ANTIOCH IN PISIDIA

- A. Paul's sermon
  - 1. History of the OT that points to Jesus -vs. 17-25
  - 2. The resurrection witnessed -vs. 26-32
  - 3. The resurrection prophesied -vs. 33-37

- 4. The demand for a decision -vs. 38-41
  - a. Through Jesus a person can be forgiven of all sins against God
  - b. Therefore, they must put their faith in God and be obedient to His will.
  - c. Verse 41 is from Habakkuk 1:5
    - i. He predicted calamity would come on Israel from Nebuchadnezzar if they did not repent.
    - ii. Today, if people will not repent of their sins they will suffer eternal calamity.

#### B. Reaction to his sermon

- 1. Almost the whole city comes to hear more of God's word
- 2. The Jews see this and are filled with envy
  - a. This envy causes them to blaspheme and to contradict Paul and Barnabas
  - b. Because of their rejection, Paul moves on to the Gentiles.

## C. Message for us today

- 1. NOTE: two statements of Paul
  - a. To those who believe he "...persuaded them to continue in the grace of God" -vs. 43
  - b. To the others, "...since you reject it, and judge yourselves unworthy of everlasting life..." -vs. 46
- 2. The application:
  - a. We have no control over how others will react to the gospel
  - b. If they accept it and follow it, we rejoice!
  - c. If not, they have sealed their own destiny

#### Conclusion:

- 1. We must not grow weary in well-doing, but continue to fight the good fight of faith.
- 2. No matter man's reaction to the word of God, His word always prevails -Ref. Is 55:10, 11
